Come here. Because of the negative form we use no or no. You can't sit down. You don't have so many bags. We can mention a person in the team, usually at the end of a sentence. You got something to eat, Greg. If you talk to more people, we use the pronoun you make a difference between them. You take these bags and you put on a car. Wait here and I'll call the police. ► Categorical imperative: is it not customary to use an exclamation mark in writing. If we put it at the end of the mandatory sentence, it will become more urgent. Examples: Wait! Don't do that! We can emphasize your request to do so. This is customary in polite requests. Or sit down. Or be reasonable. On the other hand, do so before the imperative can express the irritation of the speaker. Shut up. Will come in time. You are also demonstrating the anger or even roughness of the speaker against the team. You're going to get out of here. Don't follow me. But in another context it can show your positive emotions. Don't be so sad. ► First person: let me, let us into the first person, we do this with let + me or let + us. Examples: Let me do it for you. Let me think. - Let's go. Let's do some exercises. On the negative we put not before the imperative. Let's not worry. Spoken English can be used at the beginning of mandatory sentences. Let's not worry. ► Third person: let us do this with let him/her/them and infinitive without. Examples: Let him go. Let her explain it. Let it be. Let them try. Let customers pay right away. This form is not very common in modern English. It is more common to say the same thing differently. He has to go. She should explain this. Leave him alone. They can try. Customers must pay immediately. The negative form in the third person is archaic. Instead, we use more general forms. They don't have to stay here. Mary doesn't travel alone. ► Polite requests: can we make a polite request in English if we insert us or will be at the end of the mandatory sentence for you. It is used in positive sentences. Examples: Let's start, don't we? Be careful, don't you? If you want to be even more polite, you can use questions instead of Please, will you give me the salt? Will you help me? Could you do that for me? Do you mind opening the window? ► In the notified command, all forms above are used in live language. In indirect languages they are reported in a completely different way.
